

PigCARE Requirement:

Two or more enrichment options must be provided to pigs at all stages of production.

Enrichment should:

- Benefit the pig(s) by enhancing their physical and social environment,
- Be supplemental to what is essential for the pigs' survival and care, and
- Be provided in sufficient quantity for all pigs to benefit, e.g. at least one point-source enrichment for every 20 to 30 pigs, depending on how often the pigs use it.

Make sure to provide enrichment to all your pigs, including:

- Replacement gilts
- Gilts and sows in breeding/gestation stalls
- Boars in stalls and/or pens
- Bred gilts and sows in group pens
- Farrowing/lactating sows
- Suckling piglets
- Nursery pigs
- Grower pigs
- Finisher pigs
- Pigs in sick pens

Consult with your vetenarian before giving any consumable product to your pigs. *Always consider the impact that an occupational enrichment can have on the manure handling system and facilities, as well as the safety for the pigs.





If multiple forms of this enrichment type are provided separately, they can count as multiple enrichments. Do not use tires that contain steel/metal belting. Water drinkers of any kind do not count as enrichment.

²Electronic (sow) feeders do not count as enrichment if they only require the pig to enter a gate and then put their head in the feeder. One additional action would be required to count as enrichment.

⁴Automatic drop feeders do not count as enrichment, even if the drops occur multiple times per day.

⁵Heating pads in farrowing crates do not count as enrichment because heating devices are essential to suckling piglet survival. However, a distinct area of heated floo ing in a group pen for older pigs can count as enrichment.

⁶Could include top dressing. Phase feeding does not count as enrichment because the feed is not alternated often enough.
